THE ACMA TRUST TO BECOME A CORPORATE TRUSTEE STRUCTURE

ACMA trust has finally transformed its individual trustee structure to a corporate trustee structure. It started as one of the missions when I came to be the chair in 2014. The advantage of being a corporate structure to an individual trustee structure is both for better governance and better management. All new charitable trust established under current legislation needs to be established under a corporate trustee structure. There are vital benefit of good governance, charitable trust protection, and ASIC supervision.

From first of July 2017, ACMA trust will be under the board management of ACMA Pty Ltd with ACMA as the sole share holder of the company appointing directors to manage the running of the ACMA charitable trust. ASIC will be the relevant body for filing all corporate affairs in ACMA Pty Ltd and the Australian Tax office and ACNC will supervised on its compliance to its charitable trust status.

ACMA president, Associate Professor Vincent Lam has appointed eight members of the board of directors in ACMA Pty Ltd. They are the same as previous trustees: Mr. Albert Chan, Mr. Andrew Sue, A/Professor Christopher Zalawski, Mrs. Fifi Lai, Dr Gabriel So, Dr George Han, Mrs. Linda Tang, and Dr Stephen Li. The office bearers are: Chairman, Dr Gabriel So; Honorary Secretary Mr. Andrew Sue; Honorary Treasurer Dr George Han.

The success of this transformation is only possible with the tireless pursuit of details under the guidance of our Honorary consultant, Mrs. Cathy Lam and Mr. Andrew Sue. They provide the necessary experience and knowledge to establish our corporate trustee structure that is tailored for ACMA. REPORT ON THE 8TH ACMA MEET THE EXPERT (MTE) CONFERENCE. GSTAAD, JANUARY 2017

The annual ACMA MTE Conference (Jan 3-10, 2017), organised by Dr Stephen Hing for the 8th year in a row. The conference was held in the Huus Resort, Gstaad. Gstaad is a resort town in the Bernese Oberland region of the Swiss Alps. This area has long been a popular destination for royals and celebrities; and now ACMA members. As usual, the conference venue was scouted by Stephen 12 months prior to the delegates' arrival; ensuring that it is up to the ACMA standard.

The conference caters for

both skiers and non-skiers. Indeed, one can argue that the non-skiers usually have a fuller experience of the local scenery, culture and cuisine, as less time is "wasted" trying to slide down some crystallised water vapour. Dr Eric Yip and his wife, Bonita, for instance, both non-skiers,



travelled all the way up to the local glacier where the skiers could not reach.

The skiers, of course, also had a tremendous time on the slopes of Gstaad; while happily whinging about there being too much snow, too little snow, too sunny, too foggy, too windy, too cold, too hot, too tired, too many snow boarders, people skiing too fast (S Hing) or too slow (K Ho) and of course, being too full after lunches in the fantastic Swiss restaurants on the slopes. Our ACMA skiers' abilities ranged from beginner to advanced levels. Groups of all levels were looked after by local ski instructors on most days, ensuring that everyone had a safe and fantastic experience.

A culinarily rich day of excursion brought us to the famous cheese factory of La Maison du Gruyèrein the morning and Maison Cailler, the Swiss chocolate factory in Broc in the afternoon. A "winter is coming" / Game of Throne-like experience during lunch time was enjoyed by all delegates



and their families in the Castle of Gruyères, located in the picturesque, snow covered medieval town of Gruyères, Fribourg, one of the most famous castles in Switzerland.

In the evening, ACMA members and their families created traffic jams as we were transported by horse-drawn sleighs to the outskirts of Gstaad for a raclette dinner in a barn; amidst a moon-lit, snowblanketed field. Raclette

is a dish indigenous to parts of Switzerland during which a raclette cheese round is partially melted, then scrapped onto dinner plates; served with small firm potatoes and wine. Another day of excursion bought us to Bern, the federal city of Switzerland and capital of the canton of Bern. After having lunch in a magnificently decorated underground restaurant, the delegates were guided around the UNESCO World Heritage listed old





town and visited the most famous address in Bern (Kramgasse No. 49), the apartment block in which Albert Einstein reside when he worked as a clerk in the Swiss patent office.

And yes, there was also a clinical conference. The MTE conference has a tradition of dealing with common, practical issues in clinical practice and this year was no exception. Dr. Stephen Hing alerted us to the alarm bells of paediatric ophthalmology whilst Dr. Henry Liu showed us features of diabetic retinopathy. Dr. Cynthia Chong educated us on with electronic cigarettes. Medico-legal issues such as the requirement of chaperones (Dr Terry Chang), problems with language barrier (Dr Anita Lui) and responsibility buck-passing (Dr Eric Yip) were addressed. Updates on genetic testing from the IVF perspective (Dr Andrew Kan), lymphoedema (Dr Thomas Lam) and melanoma management (Dr Nicole Yap) added to the diversity of scientific content in this conference.

Finally, on behalf of all the delegates and their families, a sincere note of appreciation to the organisers has to be included in this report. This MTE conference, along with the preceding Practice Management Conference, have been running for almost a decade and are primarily due to the effort of one person, Stephen Hing, and his assisting spouse Lynda Lee. It is in boutique conferences like these that the ACMA goals of education and networking are most effectively achieved; not just for the delegates but also for their partners and children. I urge every member to consider participating in both conferences in the future.

PROFESSOR ALBERT LAM RECEIVES MEMBER OF THE ORDER OF AUSTRALIA HONOURS (AM)



It is exciting news for us that Professor Albert Lam, a long time member of the ACMA, received the honour of Member of the Order of Australia. This honour was given for Prof Lam for his significant contribution in the field of ultrasound in paediatric radiology. For those who don't know Prof Lam, he is the Head of Diagnostic Ultrasound, Department of Medical Imaging, Sydney Children Hospitals Network in Sydney, Australia. In addition, he also has significant academic standing in the University of Sydney Medical School as the Clinical Professor in the Disciplines of Medical Imaging and Paediatrics.

After returning from the USA in 1979, Prof Lam

established the Diagnostic Sonography Unit in the then Royal Alexandra Hospital for Children (RAHC), a predecessor of The Children's Hospital at Westmead. Prof Lam pioneered and introduced real time cranial, genito-urinary and gastrointestinal tracts sonography, hip sonography and paediatric colour Doppler imaging at the RAHC. His innovative initiatives and publications have attained Australia-wide and worldwide recognition and acceptance as established diagnostic procedures in neonatal and general paediatric practice.

Prof Lam is well published in well recognised international journals such as the New England Journal of Medicine, Radiology, Neuroradiology of North America, the British Journal of Radiology and Paediatric Radiology. He has also made contribution to further education by authoring books such as the Asia-Oceanic Textbook of Radiology.

I have the pleasure of interviewing him for this edition of MyACMA.

Welcome Professor Lam, so how do you feel about winning the award?

Well I'm quite glad, because in previous years the Order of Australia Honours have mainly been given to surgeons, cardiologists and oncologists, and not too many if at all to medical imaging practitioners. I am happy because the award is recognition of the contribution of



radiologists and medical imaging specialists to medical service.

I really do feel lucky to be in the healthcare area. Practising medicine is a most satisfying profession and I think I have made the right choice, despite a bit of hesitation when I entered University of Hong Kong. I think luckily I made the right decision.

I am sure there is a lot of hard work involved.

I think there are other factors. I am very committed to my career. There is a Chinese saying, before you can do something real good, you have to like your job. I think with all jobs, you have to see the positive side and overcome any shortfall or frustration of the job. I think this is an important message I can give to trainees these days. I think it is hard work being a medical practitioner, but it is very rewarding and you really do need to have commitment and compassion for your patients.

I think you are a very inspiring person Professor Lam, is there anything or anyone that inspired you to achieve what you have achieved?

I guess I am a very traditional Chinese. I am very proud of my Chinese heritage and traditional Chinese values and I always try to live according to traditional Chinese values and teachings

As someone who wants to connect with my Chinese culture, it is good to hear this advice. So how long have your wife Cathy and yourself been part of the ACMA?

My old hospital (RAHC) in Camperdown was close to Royal Prince Alfred Hospital. Back then the ACMA members were mainly based in the western suburbs. Dr Chris Poon, who was the President of ACMA at the time invited me to join ACMA. I said wait until The Children's Hospital move to the west. I joined ACMA when The Children's Hospital moved to the present Westmead site. So that must have been about 20 years now.

Do you feel the Association has changed much in the last 20 years?

I think a lot has changed. I am glad a lot of young blood has joined the Association. Initially it was mainly doctors from overseas, like from Malaysia, Singapore and Hong Kong. Now we have a lot of local graduates, like Professor Vincent Lam and yourself and doctors of your generation. I am seeing a lot of good changes.

Is there anything about the Association that you particularly enjoy?

I particularly like the social gatherings, especially the education seminars. I can meet some of my old friends, and it is a time for doctors to meet their peers. I think ACMA is a great support and network for doctors.

Well a final question really. Would you have any advice for young doctors in following your footsteps?

What I can only say is to appreciate and maintain your Chinese cultural heritage and background. To achieve and excel in your chosen field, you have to be passionate about what you are doing. I have been very involved with the University of Sydney and the Australian Society of Ultrasound in Medicine since I returned from the United States. It must have been thirty seven years. I have taught generations of medical graduates for so many years now, and all of the Asian doctors seem to achieve a lot. It is very satisfying for me to see this.
