President's Address

The AGM was held on 19th October. I would like to thank all the members who attended the AGM, showing support for the Association, for the democratic process, and for good governance of ACMA. Two members stood down from the Management Committee- Dr Reg Leong and Dr Tony Chu. Both of these members have busy lives and a wealth of wisdom and experience. They made a huge contribution over the past year. Tony Chu chaired the SMIC subcommittee (Social Media, Innovation and Creativity) and paved the way for the Association to reach out to young doctors in a relevant and creative format. He has opened new channels to engage with members. Reg Leong has chaired the Education Subcommittee and despite the limitations imposed by the Covid pandemic he provided a very enjoyable, informative, and useful program. I want to thank both Tony and Reg for their commitment to ACMA.

A new Management Committee of 12 members was elected- comprising two new faces- Dr Susan Chu and Dr Simon Luk. Their profiles are included elsewhere in the newsletter. They have shown generosity, collaboration and enthusiasm in standing for the election and I welcome them both to the MC and look forward to working with them this year. The following office bearers were elected- Dr Stephen Hing (President), Dr Ida Soo (Senior Vice-President), Prof Stephen Li (Vice-President), Dr Alex Ting (Secretary) and Dr Kenneth Ho (Treasurer). The other member of the Management Committee are Dr Michael Suen, Prof Vincent Lam, Dr Menolly Lee, Dr Andrew Lam, and Ass Prof Tony Pang.

The Covid Pandemic has greatly affected activities of ACMA. The recent lockdown, which started in June, forced a last-minute cancellation of an educational seminar which was to be held at Phoenix Restaurant, Rhodes. Our Winter Buffet was cancelled. A Covid Conference, planned for August, in NZ was cancelled due to the lockdown. Our Annual Conference, which was to be held in Bowral in October, has been postponed to October 2022. Our Annual Dinner was to be held on 6th Nov, was cancelled before it was announced. Our Education program was cancelled for the remainder of 2021, however our new Education Subcommittee Chair, Dr Susan Chu, has been quick off the mark, and has organised a dinner seminar for 1st December. The Meet the Experts conference, planned for Japan next January has been cancelled. I am hopeful that a full calendar can be undertaken in 2022. This will include our Chinese New Year celebration, our educational seminars, bushwalking, and other activities.



The ACMA Charitable Trust, which is administered by its own board, at arm's length from ACMA, has begun a fund raising campaign to support the Australian Nursing Home Foundation. A reception room at the new Gordon facility, currently under construction, will be named for ACMA and the ACMA Charitable Trust. She has been an ACMA member since her internship and is happy to share her experiences working in general practice and give advice for GP training.




Dr. Simon Luk - Resident Medical Officer

Simon is presently a PGY2 RMO who is based at St George Hospital and presently completing his basic physician training under the Royal Australasian College of Physicians. Alongside his clinical duties he is also an active conjoint associate lecturer with the St George and Sutherland Clinical School, UNSW. Outside of medicine his main areas of interest include hiking, snowboarding, board games, cooking, and brewing coffee. Simon is a member of the management committee and hold the position of the assistant secretary.

ACMA's Role in the COVID Pandemic

Australia, in particular NSW, has achieved amazing COVID-19 vaccination achievement. The vaccination rate has jumped from less than 10% in July to almost 95% (first dose) with more than 91% fully vaccinated by mid-November. Such achievements do not happen spontaneously. There is a group of unsung heroes working behind the scenes to make this happen so that Australia can be reopened, our economy can be restarted, and Australians can have their freedom back. The ACMA is one of those.

The ACMA has been playing an important role during the COVID-19 pandemic from the very beginning. Our Chair of Community Health Subcommittee, A/Prof Stephen Li, was appointed as the NSW Health pathology-endorsed COVID-19 Educator for the Chinese Australian community in February 2020. However, demands for information was high due to the general "fear of unknown" atmosphere in Australia so that Stephen's works have quickly expanded to cover many other culturally and linguistically diverse communities. ACMA's (in with other community collaboration government partners) webinars have been attracting 3,500 to 4,000 participants per session, and the ACMA was also approached by peak national bodies such as FECCA (Federation of Ethnic Communities Council of Australia) and Migrant Council of Australia to assist in COVID-19 education COVID-19 and vaccine promotion.



An Agency contracted by the Federal Government to run COVID-19 vaccine promotion has also told us that the Federal Government is very happy about the achievements in NSW, and invited us to assist in targeting communities in other states starting with Victoria and Queensland. Since July this year, we have delivered altogether 88 radio talks, podcasts and webinars (4 to 5 talks per week), and more than 400 talks since February last year.

Our COVID-19 educational project is the finalist in the NSW Health Pathology Awards (under the category "To keep people safe and healthy") and Stephen has been recognised as a Pandemic Hero by the Australian Parliament in 2020 and an Unsung Hero by the Aged & Community Services Australia (ACSA), the national peak body in aged care services in Australia.



Winter Warming Charitable Karaoke Night

It was a lovely night of fun and joyful camaraderie for those who attended The ACMA Winter Warming Charitable Karaoke Night held at the Marigold Restaurant on 18/6/21, organised by the ACMA Charitable Trust. 

Member Spotlight: Dr. Joseph Cheung OAM

Where were you born?

I was born in Shanghai on a freezing Christmas Eve . My father was an ENT professor at the Sun Yat Sen University in Guang Zhou (Canton,). Our family moved to Canton and later to Hong Kong in an attempt to evade the invading Japanese army. My older brother was a dental surgeon in Sydney, and my younger brother was a practicing neurosurgeon in Hong Kong until he moved back to Sydney .



What is your earliest memory?

I still just recall riding on the back of one of my father's students in a swimming pool, at the time I was about 2 year old. The young swimmer

was very caring and encouraged me to swim riding on his back just for fun. I reckon I was lucky to know how to hang on to him tight.

Where did you first study and work?

I studied medicine at the University of Sydney and graduated in 1960 (so did my two brothers, on separate occasions). I completed my internship at the Canterbury Hospital and the Royal Adelaide Hospital. Since then I have worked in Sydney, Newcastle, St Mary, Hong Kong, Canada, Melbourne, and then back to Sydney until the start of the Pandemic.

What have been the highlights of your career?

Two events - a research work at the Ottawa General Hospital pathology department where we learned a massive amount about cancers - both micro and macro.

The second event being honoured an OAM Australia for my medical contribution to the community and the service to ACMA (Victorian chapter)

Any advice for new Interns?

Take good care of your body and mental health - keep off smoking, binge drinking, gambling. To exercise regularly, maintain reasonably good health before you can help your patient better.

Your secret for a long happy life?

Can't get away from regular exercise, healthy diet and lifestyle. Maintain contact with your family, friends and the community. Maintain happy outlook and laugh often.

Dr Cheung has written a book entitled Total Health and Fitness Revolution-The Secrets to Longevity and Healthy Ageing, Combining the Traditional Wisdom of the East with the Science of the West. (available on eBay)


ACMA Zoom Chat


